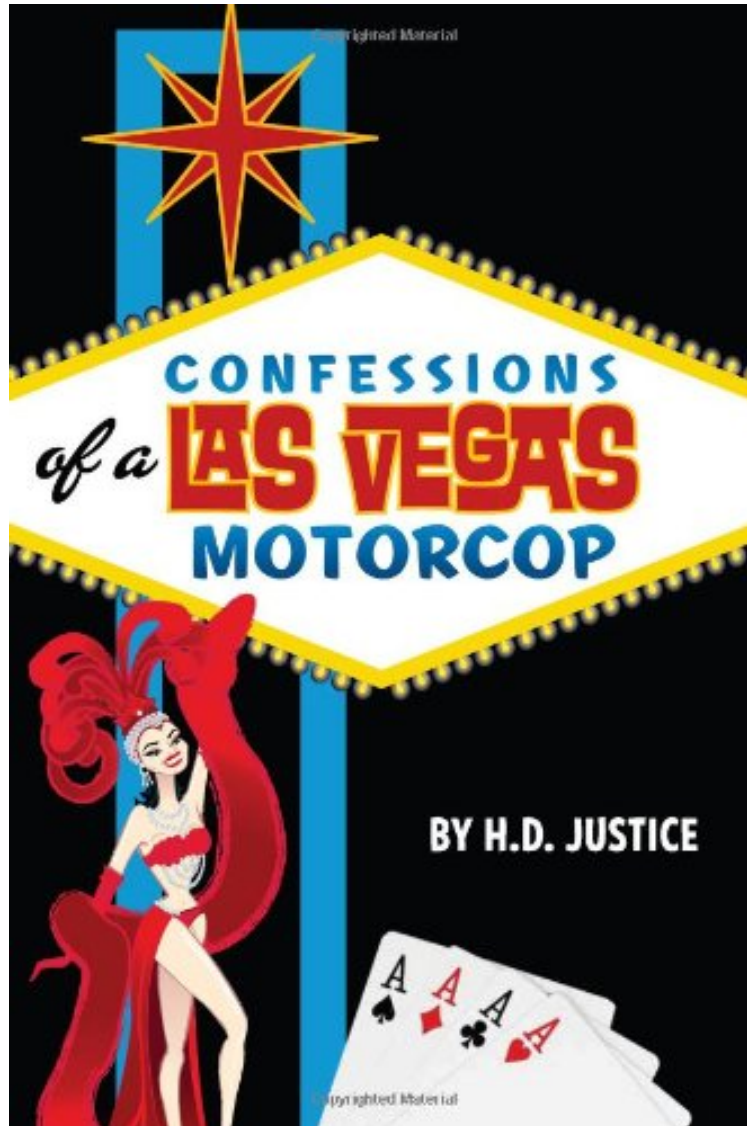

For instance the brief chapters where a litter-bug is chucking tomatoes out of his

window and the officer makes him clean his boot off after it catches one of them. Or the chapter where some drunk fool states that a cock-tail glass WITH ice was left in the car he was riding in by the last renter.... Then it bogs down in the middle and I get this ho-hum, Pollyanna, it's great being a Vegas motor cop, 'let me tell you a few feel good tales' about how I got to watch a NASCAR race from a suite, or rode my bike in a Motorola commercial or pulled back-fire stunts with my motorcycle on bicycle cops and scarred them half to death because they thought they were being shot at. Or about that time I tried to ride my cycle up a mountain pass because I didn't check the weather.... Pointless, inane stories filled the middle of the book. In its defense the story did include the most gruesome chapter at the end. However it was so curt that it might as well have been a fly on your sleeve. I'm from Nevada and my husband is a retired cop so I could actually see the hilarity in most of these stories. They were what I expected from Las Vegas, especially from an NHP officer (Remember, people, NHP is the HIGHWAY PATROL and NOT regular PD so they don't deal with many of the more "thrilling" things that happen in Vegas, just the stuff that happens on the streets. And also, CSI isn't real in any way, so if that's what you're expecting, don't bother reading this.) The stories are simply written, cops aren't fluffy with words as they're used to writing reports all day ("the facts, Ma'am, just the facts") There are a few typos but that happens with cheap, probably self-published books (I got my kindle version for free, so I didn't have high expectations on editing) All in all, I found it to be an easy, entertaining read for my morning commutes.
